Character Counts

"Don't be fooled by those who say such things, for "bad company corrupts good character." { 1 Corinthians 15:33 }

famous motivational speaker once said, "You are the average of the five people you spend the most time with." Many studies prove that to be true! The people around us can make a big impact on who we are and who we'll become.

Does that mean you should drop this devo book right now and run out to find the prettiest, richest, most popular people and make friends with them as quickly as possible? Not quite. This quote, and your key Bible verse for the day, are both focused on something a little deeper than that—character.

Our character is made up of our inner qualities. It includes things like kindness, honesty, and patience. Negative character qualities can include things like selfishness, dishonesty, and laziness. According to our key verse, these bad qualities can corrupt the good ones very quickly. For that reason, it's important to be careful about which friends we spend our time with.

While you're thinking about your friendships, don't forget that this principle applies both ways! How's your character impacting the people closest to you?

ACTION POINT: Grab your diary and take a quick friendship inventory! Think about the five closest people to you. What character qualities do you admire about them?

"Walk with the wise and become wise; associate with fools and get in trouble." { Proverbs 13:20 }



'Il never forget my fifth grade talent show. Samantha kindly offered to turn the pages while I played a difficult piano piece. But she didn't fit in at school (and I really wanted to), so I assured her I would be just fine. Everything went well—at first. But as I turned a page, my book crashed onto the keys, interrupting my performance with a jarring bang. I finished the rest of the piece through tears.

Worse than this embarrassing moment, were the times my desire for what I thought were "cool" friends led me to sin. One convinced me to date a non-Christian boy behind my parents' backs. Another sneaked a pair of itty-bitty shorts to school for me to wear without my parents knowing about it.

The Bible says that when we associate with "fools" we will get into trouble. I know something about that first hand. These friends were not as "cool" as I thought. They were my "fool" friends. They didn't believe in God (Psalm 14:1), put other people down (Proverbs 10:18), laughed at sinful things (Proverbs 10:23), hated their parents' rules (Proverbs 15:5), and couldn't be trusted (Proverbs 26:6).

Avoid friends like that. Find wise ones. They're the truly cool ones.

ACTION POINT: Which is more important to you: your friendship with God or your friendship with "cool fools?" Tell God about it by writing in your diary.

ave you ever had a bad day? Like a really, really, really bad day? Maybe you were running late and didn't have time to eat your cereal in the morning. When you got to school, you found out that you failed your math test. Then at lunch, you had a fight with your best friend, and in the afternoon, your soccer match was cancelled by a thunderstorm!

Life isn't fair sometimes. Everybody has these kinds of days now and then, but we can generally get to the next sunny day and life gets better. What about when the bad days seem to come one after the next and turn into bad weeks, or even months? What about when things are just...bad?

That means she held tightly.

Sometimes when times are hard you need to grab your nearest family member or friend and just cling! Tight! Don't be tempted to run like Orpah. If you look at the book of Ruth, one of these women got a really big blessing and the other one was never heard from again. I bet you can guess which is which. The question is: which will you be?

ACTION POINT: Go cling to someone for a little bit today.

st Daniel and the Biblical Vegetable Tales

ost people know the story of Daniel in the Lion's Den. But have you heard the story of Daniel and the vegetables? Daniel and some friends were living in Judah when the huge nation of Babylon came marching in and took over their country. They took Daniel, his friends, and other young men back to Babylon to be "re-educated." Their names were changed; their clothes were different. They had to learn a new language. And, they were allowed to eat all sorts of yummy food straight from the king's own table.

But Daniel and his three friends said no to eating the king's food. No?! Why not, what's the big deal with food?

Daniel and his friends were Jewish. They knew that the king's table would often be filled with food God said the Jewish people shouldn't eat. Eating only vegetables would make sure they obeyed God and ate only the right foods. It was a choice between obeying the king of Babylon or obeying God. Daniel 1:8 tells us Daniel and his friends put their lives on the line and obeyed God.

Isn't it interesting how the Bible tells us that they did it together? Friends can help you make good choices.

ACTION POINT: Ask God to give you strength to always obey Him, no matter what, and to provide friends who help you do that. Write a prayer in your diary.

bid you know we can learn about the power of friendship from monkeys? In a study, scientists put monkeys in cages. Then they created high stress situations using lights, noises, and other things to create fear. The monkeys sure were afraid!

Grace was so relieved finally to be able to tell her mom her painful secret. She felt a huge weight lift off her shoulders. Her mom prayed with her and began to take steps to protect her from any more hurt.

Hard things happen. Sometimes kids feel that they shouldn't talk about things that hurt them, but if they don't tell someone, they may never get the help they need. Some secrets are too harmful to keep. Speak up for those who feel they have to be silent. It may be difficult to do, but it's a big way of showing love for your friends.

ACTION POINT: Are you one of those girls who feels like you're not allowed to talk about something that's hurting you? Or do you know one of those girls? Tell an adult you trust. Let this be a day of breaking the silence.

t was a day like any other. I was working from home, when suddenly I received a phone message from my mom. "I'm late, boil some plantains for lunch."

I'm ashamed to say that my mind was flooded with selfish thoughts. "Couldn't she organize her time better? I have to stop working on my things to help her." My nieces were at my house so I asked them to help. But those bad thoughts continued until I finished making lunch.

When my nieces went to bed, I read the Bible to them. The part we read was where Jesus tells his disciples, "If anyone wants to be the first, let him be last of all and the servant of all." I knew then that God was confronting my selfish thoughts. I was reminded that it's important to serve, and to have a good attitude when doing it.

With tears in my eyes, I asked the Lord to forgive me for the attitude I had early that day and I decided to put on the glasses of gratitude. I began to thank Him, "Thank You for providing food to cook. Thank You for giving me the opportunity and ability to serve my parents."

K Time Out for Sibling Rivalry

"So Moses cried out to the Lord, 'O God, I beg you, please heal her." { Numbers 12:13 }

remember "time out." When I was bad, my mom would put me in the corner with my face to the wall. She would say, "Dannah, you need time to think about what you just did, so go to the corner where you won't be distracted by other things to think about."

Then there was "double time out." This was mom's course of action when my brother and I got into a fight. She'd call for each of us to hit a separate corner. This common experience bonded us to each other. I remember sneaking peeks at my brother and he at me. We had an unspoken code-language that we'd developed and used from corner to corner. It didn't matter how hard we'd just been fighting, we ended up with a serious case of sibling sillies. The giggles were held in as quietly as possible until my mom would announce our sentence was over and we'd fall to the floor in hysterical laughter. Being punished brought us together.

In Numbers 12, we see what you might call a holy time out for sibling rivalry. Aaron and Miriam are grumbling because Moses is hearing God's voice but they aren't. They start to say bad things about him. God punishes Miriam by letting her get sick enough that she has to go out of the village because of her sickness. Moses can't stand it. He loves her. He cries out to God to "please heal her."

Isn't it funny how we fight with our siblings? And isn't it amazing that when we get in trouble for it, we decide that we actually love them?

ACTION POINT: Declare a "holy time out" with your brother or sister today. Find a way to remember that you love each other.

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K The Real Enemy Is...

"For we are not fighting against flesh-and-blood enemies, but against evil rulers and authorities of the unseen world, against mighty powers in this dark world, and against evil spirits in the heavenly places." { Ephesians 6:12 }

o you ever get mad when someone disagrees with you? I do. I can get really frustrated at people who think differently than me. I am sometimes frustrated, irritated, and really angry. I even occassionally talk as if the person who thought differently was my enemy. Doing this causes me to lose friends and hurt people.

But here's what God started teaching me: the person who thinks differently isn't my enemy. The person who disagrees with me isn't being mean. They just think differently and someone (who is my enemy) wants to use that difference to hurt us both.

Ephesians 6:12 tells us the real enemy is Satan. The true battle is taking place behind the scenes where I can't see it. It's part of the same war that's always being fought—God versus Satan. I'll give you some encouraging information—God wins.

To fight this battle we don't even need to argue with anyone. The best thing you can do is pray for your friends, for those who think differently, and those who are hurting and scared.

ACTION POINT: Take some time to pray for a friend or family member who's angry or hurting. Maybe make a decision to pray for that person every day this week.

n ancient Rome every warrior was given a huge shield for battle. Each shield was the size of a door. The cool thing about them is that they were like puzzle pieces and could lock into each other. When the battle got intense, the soldiers could create a gigantic wall to hide behind. In the worst of battles, they made a circle with the shields on the outside and put a few above them. ne day, Jesus was at a house teaching. People had come from every village of Galilee and from Judea and Jerusalem to hear him. Can you imagine how crowded that house must've been?

Four men carrying a paralyzed man on a mat tried to take him into the house to lay him before Jesus. But they couldn't find a way. There were too many people. No one would have judged them for giving up, but their friend needed Jesus! He could not walk.

So, they got creative. It was not easy, but they took their friend to the roof and removed a tile in the ceiling so they could lower him on a mat until he was right in front of Jesus. What loyalty! They did every possible thing to take their friend to Jesus.

This is a great example of how we should act as friends. When we see the needs of our friends, do we do our best to bring them to Jesus? We can pray for them, invite them to church, start a Bible study together, and share Truth with them. But never give up on someone you love who needs Jesus!

ACTION POINT: Call some friends and ask them how you can pray for them. Then lay them right in front of Jesus today in prayer!

This time, he stepped on your school project and wrinkled the poster board when he jumped through the door wearing nothing but his Elmo boxers, a swim mask, and a Superman cape! "Ahhhhhhhhhhh!" you holler. "1...you...l can't believe...lf you...!"

Suddenly, your BFF swoops in to save the day. "Little Dude," she says, stepping between the two of you. "What she's trying to say is that she loves you a lot and likes to be near you but right now we have to get this poster finished. In fact, we could get it done faster if you would cut out these pictures for us! Take them into your room and use your special scissors."

Little brother pushes his swim mask back on his head, grabs the pictures with wide eyes, and marches off with his important assignment. Your BFF has just poured cool water on your steaming hot temper and rescued you from saying something you'd regret. That's what best friends do.

Proverbs 27:17 describes a friend as someone who helps us be our best selves. Sometimes we think best friends are the people we have a lot in common with, but the truest sense of friendship is that they help us through big bad hard things and little annoying sibling drama.

ACTION POINT: Are you the kind of friend described in Proverbs 27:17? Do you have one like that? If not, what does God need you to do about it? Write about it in a journal.

n September of 2020, the state of California faced a great forest fire! Over 22,744 acres of land BURNED and many families had to leave their homes. Wondering how this fire started? It was from one "tiny" spark.

The book of James tells us our tongues are like that spark—they have the power to set a great forest on fire. Our tongues might be small but they sure are a pretty powerful part of our bodies!

How's that possible? Have you ever whispered a rumor to a friend as soon as you got to school, only to find out it's the buzz of the cafeteria by lunchtime? Forest fire! Or have you gotten really angry at your siblings and yelled an insult, sparking a fight worthy of a wrestling ring? Forest fire!

What we say matters. One careless word can hurt for years, even if we don't mean it. The fireworks in California were for a small celebration, but they started a fire that did great damage. (It took several months to put it out!) In the same way, our words can leave a lasting impact on our friends, family, and even those we speak to harshly in passing.

Be careful what "tiny" sparks you speak.

ACTION POINT: Have you ever started a great forest fire with your words? Have you ever felt the sting of someone else's forest fire? Write in your diary about what happened, then commit to spending more time thinking before you speak!

hen I was in elementary school, I loved it so much that I "played school" whenever I got the chance. That included summers! At the end of each school year, I was so excited to take all of my workbooks and leftover school supplies home to add to my "classroom". "This is the everlasting covenant: I will always be your God and the God of your descendants after you." { Genesis 17:7 }



Gold! And he and his wife, Sarai, still didn't have any children. Whoa! Had God forgotten him? No way. In fact, God came to remind Abraham of that promise just when he was starting to wonder. Not only would he have a son, but he would be the father of many!

God also promised He'd take care of all of those children! Genesis 17:7 records something we call a "covenant." This covenant was a super big promise that God would always be the God of Abraham's family. His whole family. Not just Abraham's wife and children. Not just his grandchildren. Do you know that you're included in that covenant, too? That's right. Everyone who follows Christ is a descendant (child) of Abraham. Greta, Molly, and Kelli are sitting together at lunch. Molly and Kelli are talking about their plans for a sleepover. Kelli leaves to get a snack and as soon as she does, Molly leans over to Greta and says, "I can't stand her! I can't believe I have to spend the night at her house this weekend!" When Kelli comes back, Molly smiles big and starts talking about the sleepover again.

Molly is honoring Kelli with her lips when she is right there in front of her, but her heart is far from her.

In today's verse, Jesus describes that very thing. Some of the church leaders were speaking things that honored and glorified God, but their hearts didn't follow what their mouths were saying. They were being fake, and Jesus didn't like it—at all. Those leaders didn't realize that God doesn't focus on the outside of someone. He looks at the heart (see I Samuel 16:7).

When I was a tween, "mean girl" moments were all around. Some girls said terrible things right to my face, and others said them in a loud whisper. Have you experienced some of this?

How you treat other people really matters. If you find it really easy to be dishonest and two-faced with girls in your school, then it could be just as easy to be that way in your relationship with God. It's important that our actions match up with our words. It shows God and others that we really love them.

ACTION POINT: Write in your journal about a time you were tempted to be two-faced with a friend, or with God. Ask God to connect your heart with the words you speak.

hink about your most important relationships: parents, siblings, teachers, and friends. If you had to assign a number to those relationships, what number would you choose?

A word from the wise

"A fool is quick-tempered, but a wise person stays calm when insulted." {Proverbs 12:16}

hink of a character in a movie or book who is wise. What about that character tells you he or she has wisdom? Wise people are amazing at giving advice. It's as if they have a flashlight they shine into a situation that makes everything clear. Wisdom is different from knowledge because it's an ability to use knowledge, experience, and the Holy Spirit to figure things out. Knowledge is simply knowing stuff, which is also good but not as good as wisdom.

According to the Bible, wise people are also good at silence. They stop and take time to think, pray and watch their words.

It's easy to get angry when someone hurts your feelings, isn't it? You want to defend yourself right away or say something back to make them feel bad too. But if you do that, you're just grabbing onto that person's sin and passing it on. Instead, try to respond with silence. Think about the wise thing to say in that moment.

A verse I like to remember when I'm in a difficult situation is "Even fools are thought wise when they keep silent" (Proverbs 17:28). When I'm tempted to speak harsh words out of anger or frustration, I try to remember this verse and keep my words to myself.

ACTION POINT: Plan an evening for your family to have one hour of silence—when you can't talk at all (that includes texting!). See who has the hardest time with it, and talk about how it made you feel afterward. Ask God for wisdom in your words today.

* The Sacrifice

"He was oppressed and treated harshly, yet He never said a word. He was led like a lamb to the slaughter. And as a sheep is silent before the shearers, He did not open His mouth." { Isaiah 53:7 }



Person living in the time of the Old Testament was required to offer what was called a "sin offering" every time they did something bad (Leviticus 4:2). This meant an animal would have to die. It was usually a lamb. Can you even imagine? Your whole life you'd understand exactly what it means when a lamb takes away your sin. That sweet little creature would have to die for you. As if that weren't sad enough, lambs often died quietly without even crying out for help.

Now think of this. One day a guy named John the Baptist sees Jesus in the distance and shouts, "Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29) You would know that it meant Jesus was going to die and He wouldn't put up a fight about it! Why? Because He loves us and wants nothing to separate us from His presence!

As we experience this Resurrection season, it's not very fun to think about the horrible death that Jesus died for us but it's the most important part of our faith. Take some time to think about it today.

ACTION POINT: Grab your prayer diary and write! What's God saying to you about Jesus' death? First pray, then sit quietly while you wait for God to speak to you with a picture, story, thought or idea. Draw a picture or write in your journal.

"Again, Peter denied it. And immediately a rooster crowed." { John 18:27 }

f you live near someone who has a rooster, cock-a-doodledoo may be the first sound you hear in the morning. In the Bible, we read that Jesus told Peter he would deny he knew Christ three times before the rooster crowed the next morning. Peter probably didn't believe Him. He really did want to stick by Jesus no matter what happened. But in fact, he did deny knowing Jesus—not just once. Three times!

And then...Cock-a-doodle-doo!

Have you ever pretended you don't know Jesus? Have you been embarrassed that you go to church? Or tried to hide that you are a Christian? I'm sad to say that I've done that a time or two. It always makes me sad when I look back on it. So, let me help you if you've felt that way!

I think the sound of the crowing must've sent chills down Peter's back. "Jesus was right! I did deny Him three times!" Could it be the rooster reminded him that it was the start of a brand new day? Peter needed a fresh start. Thankfully, our God loves to give them! Psalm 30:5 says, "His anger lasts only a moment, but his favor lasts a lifetime! Weeping may last through the night, but joy comes in the morning."

Every morning is like a second chance. Remember that the next time you hear a rooster crow.

ACTION POINT: Call a family cock-a-doodle-doo contest! Bonus points for anyone who acts like a rooster, too. After you award a winner, be honest about how you sometimes pretend you don't know Jesus. Pray together asking for God's forgiveness.

"When they came to a place called The Skull [Calvary], they nailed Him to the cross. And the criminals were also crucified—one on His right and one on His left." { Luke 23:33 }

he word Calvary makes an appearance in many of the songs we sing in church, but have you ever wondered what it means? Well, it refers to the name of the mountain or hill on which Jesus was hung on the cross to die. Another name for the location is Golgotha. Both words mean "The Skull."

Some believe it was called that because it was a place of execution and where many skulls and bones littered the ground. Others believe the hill was named for its rocks that were bleached by the sun, causing them to resemble skulls. Some even say there's a possibility that from a distance something about the shape of the hill actually looked like a giant, human skull. (A little bit creepy, huh?)

One thing is definitely true about Calvary: it wasn't pretty. But what happened there produces beautiful things in our lives today.

- Because of Calvary, I know my sins are forgiven.
- Because of Calvary, I'm pure and clean.
- Because of Calvary, I have access to God's power to live in victory.
- Because of Calvary, hope can't be taken away from me or you.

ACTION POINT: Ask your family to read Luke 23:26-46 out loud with you. Pray together, thanking God for going to "The Skull" for you.

The Lord's Supper

"He took some bread and gave thanks to God for it. Then He broke it in pieces and gave it to the disciples, saying, This is My body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of Me.'" { Luke 22:19 }

hen the Israelites were being held as slaves in Egypt, God sent different plagues on the Egyptian people to convince Pharoah to let His people go. The final plague was that every firstborn son in Egypt would die on one particular night. But...if the Israelites spread the blood of a lamb or goat on their doorposts, their firstborn sons would be supernaturally protected. The angel of death "passed over" that house.

Every year after that, the Jewish people celebrated the Passover with a feast. They ate the same foods—including lamb, Matzoh balls, and bitter herbs—to remember God's protection. Jesus was eating this meal the night before He died for us. During the feast, He gave the 12 disciples the bread and wine and told them to eat those things "in remembrance of Me." This was the first Communion or the Lord's Supper.

We still practice this "remembering" today. Different churches do it in different ways but the meaning is the same. It helps us remember that Jesus shed His blood for us. The Bible says sins can't be forgiven without the shedding of blood (Hebrews 9:22). This helps us remember that His body was pierced to save us. It's good to remember what Jesus did for us.

ACTION POINT: Talk about the Lord's Supper with your mom. How does your church share Communion? Have you stopped to really think what the bread and the juice (wine) symbolize? Consider taking Communion together as a family this week.

The Famous Last Words

"When Jesus had tasted it, He said, 'It is finished!" Then He bowed His head and gave up His spirit." { John 19:30 }



But nobody knows what his last words were. When he died, he said something in German. But the nurse who was with him didn't understand German.

The last words someone speaks are usually important, especially to those closest to the one who speaks them. Jesus' last words were certainly no exception. One of the most well-known sentences He spoke on the cross was, "It is finished."

What Jesus had come to do was done. He died so you and I could have eternal life. But Jesus' last words didn't mean "the end." In fact, it meant that, for you and me and everyone else who believes in Him, it was just the beginning.

- The beginning of having a friendship with Him.
- The beginning of overcoming death to experience eternal life one day.
- The beginning of waiting for Him to return to earth a second time.

Jesus' last words declare both "it is finished" and "this is the new beginning!"

ACTION POINT: Read John 19:28-37. Write the other last words Jesus said on the cross in your prayer diary and think about what they mean to you.

The Lamb

"God showed His great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners." { Romans 5:8 }

magine you're a little Hebrew girl growing up when Jesus was on earth. One of the things you love is Lulu, the family lamb. Lulu wanders around the house bleating for your mom to feed her, curls up at your dad's feet in the evening while he tells everyone about his day, and sleeps beside you at night. She's the sweetest lamb. Your dad reminds you that you won't have Lulu forever and you believe him because you remember the other lambs. One day, Lulu will have to go to the Temple and be given to God as a sacrifice offering. It'll be a really sad day because Lulu's like a pet.

Why on earth would your dad let you grow so close to this little lamb if it was going to die? Well, for a lamb to be acceptable to God it couldn't have blemishes—it had to be a pure, spotless lamb. (See Leviticus 4:32-35.) In order for that to be possible, Hebrew families often brought a lamb out of the flock to protect it and keep it blemish-free.

When God sent his Son to die for us, Jesus became the final sacrifice for all sins. He became the pure, spotless Lamb who was killed because of our sin. If you think it was hard for that little Hebrew girl to say goodbye to Lulu the lamb, just imagine how hard it was for God to sacrifice his one and only Son.

ACTION POINT: If you know the end of the story, you know Jesus came back to life and lives in heaven. Write a thank you note to Jesus in your prayer diary.

while back, I visited the Ark Encounter. It's a museum with an amazing replica of Noah's Ark in real size! Seeing the massive size of the ark Noah built gave me a new perspective, especially on OBEDIENCE. I couldn't shake the truth that Noah obeyed. He was convinced he heard God speak and he took action. Even when it didn't make sense. Even when everyone else questioned him and made fun of him—no doubt they did, 'cause that boat was huge! But Noah moved forward in faith and obedience.

Just like Noah heard from God, you can, too. You just have to listen. As you live out your day, are you aware of God in it? Do you make space for God to be present and at work in your actions and conversations? Many don't hear God speaking because they are too busy to listen for His voice. Have you been guilty of that? I have at times.

My trip to the Ark Encounter helped me see that when God speaks it's important to listen. We must also do what God tells us to do. How different things would've been if Noah hadn't obeyed and built the ark. There are things God wants you to do in the weeks, months and years to come. He needs you to listen. He needs your willing heart to say, "Yes, God, I'll do what You want. I'll go where You want me to go."



"Once again You will have compassion on us. You will trample our sins under Your feet and throw them into the depths of the ocean!" { Micah 7:19 }



o you ever worry that God won't forgive you? Ever feel crushed by your mistakes and frustrated that you keep making them? Me, too. I want to please the Lord. I don't want to sin but the fact that I keep sinning can send me spiraling into a state of frustration, guilt, and sadness. I picture God giving me the silent treatment or zapping me with a lightning bolt because He's fed up with me. Then I remember—God doesn't have a wetsuit.

This verse in Micah 7 shines the light on the Truth that when I confess my sin to the Lord, He forgives me fully. Because of Jesus our sins are erased, not kept on a "bad girl" tally sheet in heaven. Our sins are so fully forgiven that Jesus has cast them into the depths of the sea and He doesn't own a wetsuit. He'll never dive down to the depths to drag our sins up to the surface. They're gone, washed clean by the gift of salvation.

Since Jesus has forgiven and forgotten our sins, He can help us let them go, too. When you worry that God's angry or disappointed, even after you've turned from your sin, (picture your mistakes on the bottom of the ocean, so far down in the depths you could never retrieve them) He's not. Thanks to God's mercy, that's where they are. Thanks to God's mercy, that's where they'll stay.

ACTION POINT: Ask your mom to help you write down some prayers to help you repent and ask the Lord to throw your sin into the ocean.

ne of the sweetest memories from my childhood is my mother's garden. As much as I loved the garden, I also really hated seeding and weeding. Major yuck. I don't think I know anyone who is crazy about pulling weeds out of a garden.

Planting seeds was always really boring for me. As the seed starts to sprout it gets interesting, but until then—yawn.

You may be wondering why the people in Psalm 126 were weeping while they went to plant their seeds. Sure, maybe some of them cried because they were bored like I was as a child gardener, but there was another, more meaningful reason.

They cried when they put the seed in the ground because they were so hungry. They could have just eaten the seeds and been satisfied for the moment. But they knew if they hid the seed in the soil, watered it, and waited until the plants grew, the harvest would be great, and many would have nourishment for a much longer time than if they would have just eaten the seed.

It's the same with God's Word. Psalm 119:11 says, "I have hidden your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you." When you read the Bible, you have a choice. You can just read it and say, "Wow. That's cool," and go on with life or you can read it and hide it deep in your heart, allowing it to change your life. In this way, you are preparing yourself to "reuse" the truth time and time again.

ACTION POINT: Ask your mom to share one of her favorite Bible verses. Hide that verse in your heart, and apply it to your life!



ave you ever done something wrong that affected a friendship? You admit what you did was wrong, apologized, and took steps to make the situation right but...it's just not the same? The Message in the Sunrise

"The faithful love of the Lord never ends! His mercies never cease. Great is His faithfulness; His mercies begin afresh each morning." { Lamentations 3:22-23 }

hen was the last time you saw the sunrise? Set your alarm for zero dark thirty tomorrow morning. (That's way earlier than you want to!) Find an eastern facing window, and watch as the Lord shows the world one of the most wonderful things about His character—His faithfulness. Every morning when the sun rises, the Lord is teaching us a parable (a parable is a story with a point). The point of the sunrise is this: God is faithful.

Even when the world is in chaos, the sun rises. Even when we're too sick or too sad to get out of bed, the sun rises. It's a declaration that, no matter what, He's faithful.

Because God's faithful, every sunrise is also teaching a second parable—the newness of God's rich mercies. That means that the mistakes you made yesterday are forgotten in heaven this morning. The sins you committed last year are gone. There are new mercies proclaimed in the bright morning sky.

Every morning since creation dawned, God has painted the sky with these Truths: I am faithful and I will have mercy on you. These are beautiful life changing messages. Messages that can reshape our days, our weeks, our lives. We can count on God's faithfulness and mercy as much as we can count on the sun coming up tomorrow. What good news!

ACTION POINT: Watch the sunrise. As you do, read Lamentations 3:22-23 out loud. Thank the Lord for offering you a new beginning every day.

"The rain and snow come down from the heavens and stay on the ground to water the earth. They cause the grain to grow, producing seed for the farmer and bread for the hungry. It is the same with My Word. I send it out and it always produces fruit. It will accomplish all I want it to, and it will prosper everywhere I send it." { Isaiah 55:10-11 }

s there anything better than a snow day? We get a lot of snow in Pennsylvania. From Thanksgiving Day until nearly Easter, we're braced for it with snow shovels and buckets of salt to melt the ice on our walkway. We also have our sleds ready! I like to "pony sled." That's what we call it when we tie a sled to the back of my horse, Trigg, and he pulls us around! I ride him while my friends hold on and giggle.

I've seen a lot of beautiful snow days but let me tell you what I've not seen. In all my years, I've never seen a spring tulip immediately poke up from the ground the day we get a snowfall. But that's exactly what's happening. God sends the snow and rain to feed the sleeping roots and flower bulbs nestled underground. Snow days are growing days.

The process is gradual. Isaiah 55:10-11 teaches us that the Word of God works a lot like snow and rain. God's words are "watering" important things that He's planted in your mind and soul. Seeds of goodness and mighty works of God are getting the nutrients they need every time you open the Bible and read it—His Word "always produces fruit."

I can't see it yet. You probably can't either. But something good is growing!

hroughout my teaching career I've had many students who had a hard time using self-control. The biggest problem is talking before being called upon! I once had a sixth grade student who talked to everyone he sat next to and it was becoming a huge distraction in the classroom. One day he got two warning slips for talking. The next day in class I made sure he knew it was a fresh start and that I loved him.

Needless to say, I got to know him and his parents very well because I was speaking with them frequently. I wanted to make sure he and his parents knew that I loved him. Even though I had to keep track of his warning slips that turned into detentions, it wasn't changing my love for him. I often reminded my student of this: just like he was starting fresh in my class, we start fresh every day with Jesus.

One of the coolest things about Jesus is that He gives us new mercies every morning when we wake up. He, unlike teachers, isn't keeping track of all our sins and writing warning slips that turn into detentions. No, we get a clean slate from the moment we confess and repent of our sins. That's how much God loves us.

>> ACTION POINT: What do you do when you get into trouble? Do you think your parents love you less? Ask your mom if there was a time in her life when she thought God loved her less because of something she had done.

t was a beautiful afternoon and one of my girls was playing and running around. Suddenly, she fell very hard on her knee and it started bleeding. I took care of her and in a couple of minutes, she was running again. Do you know what happened next? She fell again. Crying, she came back to me. I cleaned her wound and she sat down for a few minutes before getting back up to play. She hurt that same knee more than three times that week!

Seeing my daughter hurt and coming to me for help after each fall taught me a lesson. You see, though she fell many times, I continued helping her. God does the same for us when we fall down or fail at something. Even if it happens several times, God's always there to heal, love, and instruct us.

Have you ever thought, in the midst of your failures, that God got tired or gave up on you? I certainly have. Through my daughter's injuries, God reminded me that He'll neither grow tired of me nor give up on me. No matter how many times we fail, we can run into His arms. He recognizes our need and His faithful love will be there to embrace us and set us back on our feet.

His love never fails.

ACTION POINT: Are you struggling with the same sin over and over again? Prayerfully confess that sin to God and ask Him to help you overcome it. Then, talk to your mom about the sin and come up with ways that she can help you overcome it. Ask her to pray over you for your sin to stop.

agles are amazing! With incredibly strong eyes that are about eight times stronger than ours, swift movement that allows them to catch fish as they swim, and tons of other cool abilities, it's safe to say that they're truly fascinating creatures.

An eagle's flight is a magnificent sight. Their powerful wings allow them to fly up to 10,000 feet above the ground! The way they soar through the clouds with such strength would make you think they're using lots of energy but, in reality, they're actually asserting very little. They've learned to rest and glide allowing their wings to catch the wind perfectly.

By watching eagles, we can learn how to soar. Isaiah 40:31 shows us that our strength is refilled by Jesus alone. It's by His strength that we soar on wings like eagles. We need only rest and glide in Him.

Life can be tough. It's normal to feel tired at times but we must remember that our strength and renewal comes from Jesus. Running to His word and bringing all of our cares and worries to Him in prayer is what renews His strength within us. Rest in His wings and soar.

Good Dirt

"Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown." { Matthew 13:8 } (NIV)

arming is tricky business. It's like telling people about Jesus. You can talk about Jesus' plan for salvation, but it's up to the people who hear the words to decide if it makes any difference in their lives.

In this parable, "seeds" are a symbol of God's truth and the "soil" is a symbol of people who hear the truth.

Some seeds fell along the packed down, hard path and they rested on top of it. The birds grabbed them all for dinner. *Have you ever met someone who had a really hard heart?* She may hear the truth but doesn't accept it. It gets snatched away because she doesn't hold onto it.

Seeds that fell in that shallow, rocky soil grew up quickly and got burned by the sun because their roots weren't deep. I know people who gave their hearts to Jesus but they never got in the Word and let their "roots" get deep in their relationship with Him.

Other seeds fell where the plants were choked by thorns. Some plants can't live beside other plants because one will overpower the other.

But seeds that fall into soft soil, like God's Word, falls onto a tender, willing heart, bears much fruit.

ACTION POINT: What kind of soil do you feel describes your heart right now? Take time to ask God to transform your heart into a soft, nourishing place for His Word to grow.
