



s a mom, you work hard to make sure your daughter is ready. Is she ready for bed? Ready for church? Ready for practice, the game, or that performance? Ready for her test? Ready to start babysitting for the first time? Ready to be baptized? Ready for school? (Wait. Already? Where did summer go?!)

When you help your daughter to be ready for what comes next—like the upcoming school year—you are being DILIGENT. Diligence is careful, persistent, focused effort. And while your daughter may not be there yet, she's learning it as you model it.

Did you know diligence is a biblical quality that's written about often in the Scriptures, mostly in relation to how we approach our spiritual life? But it's also important for our work. Whether making your bed or building a budget for your Etsy store, God's Word encourages diligence. As you practice it, your daughter is learning it. And the beginning of school seems like a great time to teach her about it more directly. You'll do that using this month's verse:

Work hard so you can present yourself to God and receive his approval. Be a 900d worker, one who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly explains the word of truth. 2 TIMOTHY 2:15

Let me use this verse to remind you: God sees your consistent commitment to raising your daughter. Keep doing the hard work! He approves! It matters to the Lord, and your daughter must may catch this quality from you and grow into a diligent woman of God.


MATERIALS YOU'LL NEED:

Pick a morning before school starts. Let your daughter know that she'll be playing the role of Mom by making sure that **you** are ready for school. You'll play the role of Daughter.


In the morning, let your daughter wake you up and "get you to school" on time.

- What does the word diligence mean? Why do you think God cares about how hard you work?
- What did role reversal feel like to you? How does it feel when you're trying to be diligent but the person you're working with is not?
- What are some things you can do each day to be ready for school?
- How can I help you work hard and do your best for God this year?
