### Baby Steps

Walk with the wise and become wise; associate with fools and get in trouble. { Proverbs 13:20 }

am guessing that someone helped you learn to walk. Who was it? Your mom? Your dad? Your MeeMaw or Gigi? Maybe your Grampy? None of us learns to walk without help. It's important to know how to walk, and not just so we can get places. Walking makes us happier, helps us do well in school, teaches us to breathe better, and relaxes us. It affects more than you would think.

The same is true of learning to do relationships. You need a godly person—like your mom, big sister, or youth leader—to help you learn. When you find that person, you'll discover you're learning about much more than friendship. They'll teach you patience and persistence, math and how to have a hobby, and—most importantly—help you in your relationship with God. A wise person helps you become wise.

But don't take my word for it. The Bible teaches us a lot about friendship, and Proverbs 13:20 says that when we "walk with the wise," we become wise. Think about that! Just like it took someone to teach your legs to walk, this verse suggests that living life takes teaching and support from someone older and wiser.

ACTION POINT: Do you have an older, wiser person helping you learn how to do life? Write a thank-you letter to them. If you don't, write God a prayer, asking Him to help you find someone to help you grow wise.

o you ever braid your hair? Do you get fancy and do waterfall braids, French braids, or cornrows? My hair was always long when I was younger, and I was determined to learn how to braid. I learned on my horse's tail. Yes, I actually had a real, live horse, but that's not the tail I practiced on. I practiced on my toy horse's tail.

Over and over, I separated the tail into three sections and practiced one side crossing the middle strand and then the other side. Back and forth, back and forth, until it was a three-stranded braid! Then I practiced on my own head until I got it down.

Just like braiding, finding good friends can take some practice. Every time you experience difficulty with a friend, you're learning how to choose friends who walk with you and Jesus as you all go through life together.

Those three strands—you, your friend, and Jesus woven together—will help protect you when life gets hard.

ACTION POINT: Braid something-a doll's hair, your hair, or even your dad's beard-and pray that God would give you wisdom in choosing friends who walk with you through life.

ow are you with asking for advice? Maybe you cringe at the thought sometimes. But when you and I ask others for their wise input, it gives us a chance to grow—unless we ask for advice from people who only tell us what we want to hear.


For example, you're wearing a new outfit that doesn't pass the "Truth or Bare" fashion tests. You decide to bypass a caring friend who will be straight up with you, and head for someone who tells you what you want to hear. A hard truth can often feel like rejection, which does not always "feel" good.

What do you think your caring friend would have said? When we seek advice from positive resources, it is the best for us. Rather than surrounding yourself with people who say "yes" to your choices. Trust and lean on someone who would rather be honest, and care about the person of character you are growing into. This is like God, who grants the greatest wisdom and most loving insight.

ACTION POINT: The next time you need help, ask God FIRST. Try to do that in every situation. Also, find mom, dad, or other wise people to ask. Watch God bring the answers straight to your heart and help you grow in wisdom.

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My child, if sinners entice you, turn your back on them! { Proverbs 1:10 }



Peer pressure is the influence your peers have on you. It can be good or bad. When you spend time with someone, you learn to do what they do and like what they like. So it's important to know how those you spend time with affect you. Do they make you a better or worse person?

In Proverbs, we are told to turn our back on those who tempt us to do bad things. Take some time to think carefully about those you choose to be like. Is there anyone encouraging you to do things that go against what God's Word tells you? If so, it's time to look for peers whose influence helps you be more like Christ. If you're having a hard time finding a good group of friends, maybe you can start your own and ask God to show you how to be a good and positive peer.

ACTION POINT: Make a list of your peers and describe how They make you feel. Pray and ask God to help you choose friends who will point you to Him. Also, think about the kind of peer you are.

er name was Molly, and her family was new to our church. That was all the 7th-grade-me knew about the quiet girl in the angel costume at our church nativity.



God designed friendship. He delights in bonding us with others who will encourage us to stay close to Him.

ACTION POINT: If you have a good friend who turns your eyes toward Jesus, thank God for her! If you don't pray with your mom that God will send you a Jesus-loving friend who will encourage you to grow closer to Him.

So, how do you know whether you have genuine or fake friends?

There are a few ways you can tell, but today's verse gives two big hints.

#### Genuine Friends:

- Love each other with genuine affection. (They're there for you when you need them.)
- Take delight in honoring each other. (They encourage you and don't gossip about you.)

#### **Fake Friends:**

- Stay friends when they need you, but distance themselves when you need them.
- Are nice to your face, but talk about you behind your back.

How do your friendships measure up? And, maybe more importantly, how do YOU measure up as a friend? One of the best ways to attract genuine friends is to BE a genuine friend first.

ACTION POINT: Have you been a fake friend to anyone? If so, think about how you can apologize and treat them with genuine affection and honor moving forward.

n middle school, I didn't like going to church services because I was super shy and didn't want to talk to anyone. One day, a girl I had just met came up to me and said, "Hey Julia, do you wanna skip church tonight and go to the coffee shop instead?" She was not a very good influence. She always got in trouble and was sometimes sent home from camps.

I knew that if I skipped and my mom found out, I would be in so much trouble and feel guilty. So I decided to go to the service and invited the girl to sit with me there. I'm so glad we didn't skip because we learned about listening and honoring our parents, even when there is peer pressure to not listen to them.

ACTION POINT: Do one thing today to be the friend who shows how God's love is amazing! Maybe it's sharing your favorite verse, inviting someone to church, or offering to pray with a friend who feels discouraged.

ave you ever been in a play? I have been in a few shows, and the hardest part was memorizing the lines. I had to read them and think about them all day long. But, once I knew them, playing my part was pretty fun. I remembered what to say and do in each scene. And, if someone else didn't know their lines, I could help them because the script was burned into my mind!

God's Word is like the script for your life. He wants you to meditate on it—thinking deeply or carefully about it—all the time. It will help you enjoy doing the right thing. You won't be happy hanging with the wrong people because His Truth will remind you of what brings true joy.

We'll all have times when we're tempted to say or do the wrong things because of the people we're around. But God wants to make sure we have our "lines" memorized so that we follow His way no matter the situation.

ACTION POINT: Find a Bible verse about making good decisions. Ask some friends to meditate on it with you. Challenge each other to use it when you're tempted to make a bad choice. Check in with each other for accountability and encouragement.

Suddenly, it made sense! They didn't want her to sit with us. The new girl stood at our table, looking around. I wanted to shout, "Sit here!" But I didn't.

Now she is active in a church and even went on a mission trip this summer. Sophie even told me that her mom accepted Jesus recently too! Sophie is inviting others to accept Jesus as she did.

When Paul was faced with the decision to teach in Jesus' name or suffer the consequences, he chose to continue teaching. He didn't worry about what others could do to him or would think about him. Paul chose Jesus!

My new friend is now my new sister in Christ. As today's verse says, the most powerful peer pressure is when friends "love so much that they share with others not only God's Good News but their own lives. too."

At the lunch table, I kept looking down because I was afraid of what others might say. Finally, the new girl walked away. That night I couldn't stop thinking about it. Why had I been a part of something so mean? Why did I feel so bad?

ACTION POINT: Make a list of your peers who do not know Jesus yet. Tape it on your mirror. When you "peer" into your mirror each day, pray for these "peers" to accept Christ.

The Bible tells us it is better to please God than people. But unlike Paul, I chose to please my friends at lunch. I chose them over God.

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ACTION POINT: For one week, keep a list of the situations and times you choose God over your friends or other people. Next to each one, write how your choice made you feel.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a huge crowd of witnesses to the life of faith, let us strip off every weight that slows us down, especially the sin that so easily trips us up. And let us run with endurance the race God has set before us. We do this by keeping our eyes on Jesus, the champion who initiates and perfects our faith.

{ Hebrews 12:1-2 }

et's imagine you are running a race. Your mind is set on the finish line. As you run along the dusty road, you encounter uphill climbs and downhill jogs, a few potholes, quite a bit of exhaustion, and lots and LOTS of sweat! Oh, but wait! There's one thing we forgot. Turn and look to the right and left of the road. Do you see the people standing on the sidelines, cheering you on as you huff and puff?

The Bible calls those people "witnesses." It says they are encouraging examples for us as we run the race of faith. In Hebrews 11, Paul tells us they are men and women like Abraham, Moses, and Rahab who choose to do hard things because of their faith in God. As we go through life, these people and their faith stories can be an encouragement to us, *and* we also can be encouraged by those in our close circles, like our friends and family.

As Christians, we need to have people in our lives whose faith we can learn from—people who inspire us with their courage and experiences!

ACTION POINT: Make a "witness list." Who can you look up to as godly examples in your life? After writing some names down, read Hebrews 11. Whose faith is an encouragement to you from that list?

I am a friend to anyone who fears you —anyone who obeys your commandments. { Psalm 119:63 }

o you have nicknames for your friends? My name is Arlene, and my friends shortened that to Ar. Two of my friends were named Barbara and Martha. We had a math teacher who would say, "Oh look, here comes Ar, Bar, and Mar!" It was so fun that our nicknames rhymed!

Thinking of my school friends still makes me smile today. I looked for friends who loved Jesus and who would be a good influence on me. I found those friends in "Bar" and "Mar." In today's Bible verse, we learn what kind of person we should seek as a friend: anyone who fears God and obeys His commandments. Remember that the word "fear" here doesn't mean you are afraid of God. It means you respect Him, just like you would respect your teacher, principal, parent, or coach. Do your friends respect God?

We tend to pick up the attitudes, sayings, fashions, and values of our closest friends. So choose friends whose influence will bring you closer to Christ, not further away from Him.

ACTION POINT: If you don't have a faithful friend in your life, pray now and ask God to bring you a friend who loves Jesus and follows His commands.

After attending the camp, I realized my stubbornness was holding me back. I came home from it with better relationships with other people, but more importantly, with Jesus. The camp was such a life-giving memory I would've never experienced without my loving cousin's positive peer pressure.

ACTION POINT: How will you use positive peer pressure in your sphere of influence this week? Write down a list of ideas in your journal.

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### Recycled Friendship Advice

Don't let anyone fool you. "Bad companions make a good person bad." { | Corinthians | 15:33 }

still cannot believe I did it. But I did. My cousin had been saving aluminum cans to cash them in at the recycling center. He planned to spend the extra money at the county fair. But instead of enjoying the reward of his hard work, I took those cans and cashed them in for my thirteenyear-old self and my fourteen-year-old friend. For the record, that's called stealing! And when my mom and aunt found out, I was in the biggest trouble ever.

There's one reason I did this—something I would never have imagined doing. I was hanging out with a friend who was not a good influence. Take my advice: don't spend time with girls (or guys) who don't make wise choices. You might not believe it, but you'll also make foolish decisions.

This isn't just my advice. I'm recycling some words from the Bible! First Corinthians 15:33 tells us that if you spend time with friends who behave badly, you'll end up acting like them.

After a lot of advice from my parents, I decided to stop spending time with that friend. Sometimes it's OK to step back from a relationship that's not good for you.

ACTION POINT: Do you need to step away from a relationship that's not good for you? Talk to your mom or dad if you think you might.

et away from me, Satan!" Can you imagine saying that to one of your closest friends? I can't—and I don't recommend it either! But that's exactly what lesus told Peter in Matthew 16:23.

Jesus had revealed to His disciples that He would suffer, die, and come back to life. Peter's response was to correct Jesus (Matthew 16:22). Yet Jesus recognized Peter's words for what they were: peer pressure. While Peter had good intentions, he was trying to persuade Jesus to stray from God's perfect plan.

Hebrews 4:14–16 reminds us that Jesus was tempted. And His words in Matthew 16 show Him resisting the invitation to choose a different way. But, even though lesus never gave in to temptation, He does know what it feels like to experience it.

So the next time you're pressured to stray from God's good plan, remember that Jesus understands. You can boldly ask Him to help you say no to temptation and yes to Him.

ACTION POINT: Grab paper and your colored pencils. Create a short graphic novel telling the story from Matthew 16:22-28. Be sure to show how you think Peter's expression and attitude changed after Jesus withstood the temptation.

once decided to paddleboard to an island in the Aegean Sea. Did I bring drinking water? No. A lifejacket? No. Was this a great idea? No. The island didn't look far away, but the hours rolled by as I paddled, and my strength drained. The waves got higher, the shore farther, and I began to feel faint. Then, my paddleboard started sinking!

But, I forgot to tell you one important detail: I was with a friend. She told me to lay down and began pulling my sinking board and me. Imagine what could have happened if I had been alone!

It is easy to think that we are strong enough to battle everything alone, but the Bible says when God created humans, He said it wasn't good for us to be alone! He designed us to be relational—just like Him. God is always with us, but He also places other people around us to encourage and convict us.

Because my friend was with me, she helped me when I felt weak. Two people are better than one, and here's a little acronym that one of my friends taught me to help remember that: TWO = Together We Overcome!

ACTION POINT: Design a poster using the acronym TWO.

Discuss with your mom who the "paddleboard pals" might be in your life. Write a few of their names on the poster. Hang it up somewhere as an encouraging reminder.

I was in school. Whether it was my teacher explaining the next lesson or my friends giving me advice about a situation, I felt like there was a constant stream of input coming my way. I soaked in as much as I could so that I'd be smart and wise in the future. But looking back on it, I didn't truly understand what wisdom was and I wasn't looking for it in the right places.

It's so easy to fall into the trap of searching for things—only God can provide—in all the wrong places. In His Word, God reminds us that He is the source of wisdom. Following Him is what makes us wise and trains us in making the best decisions in life.

Don't be confused about wisdom or let the world pressure you into believing there's any other source besides God. Getting straight A's in school is great, but that isn't what makes us wise. Receiving advice from friends can be awesome, but if God isn't the ultimate source of their advice, it's not going to make us any wiser.

Never forget that wisdom comes from God and God alone. You can trust Him to be the source.

ACTION POINT: Have you been pressured into searching for wisdom in the wrong places like school or advice from lots of people? Spend some time asking God to help you believe that He is the source of wisdom.

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### Share Your Burdens

Share each other's burdens and in this way obey the law of Christ.

{ Galatians 6:2 }

nce, I was home all by myself. My day had been hard, and I felt lonely and sad. So I called my friend who lived nearby and said, "I am lonely and I've got tacos cooking. Will you come and sit with me?" It turns out my friend had also had a tough day. She had failed a very important test.

She came over, and we ate tacos. As we talked, we also cried together. We shared each other's burdens. While it's important to talk and cry together sometimes, what's even more important is speaking truth to each other. And that's exactly what we did. When we finished crying, we spoke God's Truth, using Bible verses that we knew by heart. We reminded each other that God has a plan and a purpose for our lives and that even when everything feels like it is falling apart, He is still in control. Hearing that truth made both of us feel better!

ACTION POINT: Memorize a Bible verse that has encouraged you and use it to encourage a friend the next time she is sad.

love the Word of God! But sometimes, I miss what God is really trying to say if I don't fully understand the meaning of the verse. I remember memorizing this verse in high school and thinking, "How could I copy the behaviors of the world?" I quickly realized that this verse is saying: Don't just go along with whatever society says is OK.

This verse became real to me when my best friend started lying to her parents and asked me to do it too. I had a decision to make: Was I going to go along with what my best friend wanted and lie? Our world says it is normal to lie to our parents when we are young. This verse says that when we say no to the things of this world, God will renew our minds so we can pursue better things in Him!

ACTION POINT: Take some time to journal about a time when you should have said no to when a friend asked you to do something.

eople have a lot to say about everything—the weather, world events, and especially other people. It's said that 80% of our conversations are about other people's lives. That means that at some point, someone will have something to say about each of us. It may be good, or it may be bad, but they're going to talk.

The way we live may cause people to speak badly about us or call us imposters, but we shouldn't react the way the world expects us to. We're called to fight the pressure to be reactive and instead respond in love while we continue to serve God.

ACTION POINT: Has someone ever said something bad about you? How did you respond? Did you follow the world's pressure to react? Or did you handle it like a Jesus follower? Ask God to help you always handle things His way.



iddle school and high school were tough years for me. I was always in trouble and had a hard time following rules. I didn't make the best decisions,

and everyone knew that about me.

I had a few friends who were the same way. We pressured each other to do the wrong things, leading to some pretty tough situations.

After becoming a follower of Jesus, people noticed changes in my attitude and behavior. I spoke in a kinder way and said no to the situations I'd once said yes to. ACTION POINT: Smile for two minutes. Seriously. A very scientific piece of research says that if we smile for two minutes, we'll feel happier. It will be good practice for bad days!

ACTION POINT: In 2 Samuel 6:14, "David danced before the LORD with all his might." Do you like to dance, sing, or play an instrument? Spend some time worshipping God with all your might.

ave you ever looked in a lake and found your reflection? The water may have been rough, causing the image to be blurry. But what if the water was peacefully still? You'd get a clearer picture.

I love how God has the best view of things and gives perfect examples. Proverbs 17:29 talks about how just as water can reflect our faces, our hearts show who we are inside. And this verse doesn't mean our blood-pumping hearts. Our Creator is referencing the inner pool where our feelings and beliefs gather.

It's time to gaze upon that heart reflection. Are you seeing a clear picture of the person of dignity God created you to be? Or is the reflection blurry and hard to see because of what you've allowed in your heart that doesn't match what God says about you in His Word?

Jesus is called "the light of the world" (John 8:12). When you ask Him to shine His light into your heart, you'll see more of Him in your reflection. Who you are inside will start to look like Him. Do you know Him? If so, keep letting the light in and watch it show in your reflection.

ACTION POINT: Still your heart and ask God to give you wisdom on what needs to be filtered out. Ask Him to help you reflect the image He wants to see when He looks at you — His magnificent creation.

've been playing the viola for eighteen years, and I LOVE IT! When I played in school, we'd take playing tests each month. woman in California went to pick up some free, used couches she'd found online for her new home. She was completely shocked when she inspected the sofas. Inside the cushions, she found multiple envelopes filled with cash. She returned the money to the people giving away the couches and eventually learned there had been \$36,000 hidden inside the cushions. Ordinary-looking couches, which had been given away for free, were worth far more than anyone could imagine!

In Colossians 1:27, Paul states that believers also have a treasure inside them. If you are a follower of Jesus, then you have His Spirit living in you, which is far more valuable than any amount of money. His Spirit is always at work, changing you and me to be more like Him every day. We don't have to act like the rest of the world. We have the Spirit of Jesus living inside us, giving us the power to bring His light and love to the world around us.

n April 29th, not too many years ago, I headed to my favorite hair salon, where I was given the royal treatment. Hair. Nails. Make-up. Then, I put on the most beautiful dress I have ever owned. In 1 Timothy 2:9–10, women are told what they "should wear." In some Bible versions, the word *adorned* is used in the same place. Adorned means well-presented, orderly in appearance, and ornamented (or accessorized).

You know what that tells me? Being modest or dignified in how you present yourself is *not* anti-fashion. First Timothy 2:9–10 tells us we *should* be adorned. The question is not *if*, but *how*. Being adorned is about way more than the clothes we wear. Modesty is a power that protects the ability of others to see God's good works in your heart and through your life. It's not meant to hide your body but to reveal the true beauty that grows within you.

ACTION POINT: Draw a picture about a time when you felt particularly beautiful and adorned. Then, write a description of what you were wearing and how you felt.

o you know what's undignified? Dust! Nobody likes dust. As a matter of fact, dusting is my least favorite chore. I dread cleaning dust from the shelves in my home. And there isn't just dust in our houses. There's the dust of the ground—dirt and sand—that you can find outside. You probably don't think of the dirt and sand as dignified when you play sports in the backyard or run along the beach.

# Dignity Defined

So God created human beings in his own image. In the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. { Genesis 1:27 }



few years ago, I was angry. Actually, that's an understatement. I was furious! Someone I deeply cared about had wounded me with their sharp words. And, instead of holding my tongue, I said every mean thing I could think of. If that wasn't enough, on my way home, I called my friends to gossip about how angry I was with this person. Whew! That was definitely not my proudest moment! Interestingly, I felt worse after speaking unkindly than after being spoken unkindly to.

But why do unkind words hurt? Well, my friend, it all comes down to one word: DIGNITY! Dignity describes something deserving of worth, honor, and respect. Every human has dignity because we are created in God's image. Each of us, on our own, deserves nothing because there is nothing good or "worthy" inside us (Romans 7:18), but because of God, we have value. Everyone should be treated with dignity—not because of who WE are, but because of the God whose image we bear.

ACTION POINT: Talk with your mom about someone who's hard to treat with respect. Write down three truths the Bible says about them and one good thing you see in them. Now choose one simple way you can treat them with dignity.



to see all of our clothes and underwear hanging in the trees at our public campsite. While the boys laughed, we climbed around in our pajamas to reclaim our clothes. How embarrassing! But guess what we did? We laughed too! Those sneaky boys tried to steal more than our clothes. They tried to steal our dignity. But we hung on to dignity with Jesus' JOY!.

One of the easiest ways to practice dignity is to watch our tongues when we want to complain about others. And, we can always run to our moms for help in situations. But gossiping and being rude won't help anything.

Those who hung lesus on the cross stole His clothes also. But Hebrews 12:3 says Jesus hung on with JOY so that today we can live "clothed with strength, dignity, and laugh without fear" (Proverbs 31:25). So, whenever that sneaky devil tries to steal your dignity, remember that as today's verse says, "the joy of the Lord is your strength." You can stay wrapped in Christ's robe of dignity—even if your little brother tries to steal your clothes!

ACTION POINT: After a really frustrating day, try to practice self-control. Instead of gossiping or being rude, talk through your frustrations with your mom or a trusted adult in your life!

ACTION POINT: Joy can help you keep your confidence when people or situations try to steal your dignity. This week, when you get dressed, thank Jesus for giving up His dignity so you can live clothed in strength, dignity, and joy.

Yet, Jesus—the Creator of the Universe— dropped to His knees in humility to wash the feet of His precious friends. Jesus *chose* this. It was an action of humility.

First Peter 5:5 reads, "Dress yourself...with humility." To dress yourself is an action. It's a choice. So, as you choose an action of humility—like helping your brother with a chore, or changing your baby sister's diaper, or offering to take out the classroom trash—you're doing the action of "clothing yourself with humility." Just like Jesus when His humble hands washed icky feet!

ACTION POINT: Go wash your feet. And consider how Jesus—the Creator of the Universe—washed the icky feet of His Friends. Then, think about how you can be like Him.

ave you ever walked into a room feeling really good? When I was seven, I sang at my first performance. Afterward, I walked into the reception with my head held high. will not walk blindfold, like a beggar or a prisoner," Gimli the Dwarf declares in the book *The Lord of the Rings*. Gimli and his seven friends (two men, one elf, and four hobbits) are traveling through a magical forest where elves live. Because elves don't trust dwarfs to see their home, Gimli is asked to wear a blindfold.

His dignity is hurt. He's insulted and feels less respected than everyone else.

What do Gimli's friends do? They offer to wear blindfolds too. They give up their right to see, so their friend feels less alone. These two men, one elf, and four hobbits affirm Gimli's worth by sharing his blindfold burden.

You can do the same for others. Maybe you have a classmate who always gets picked last for dodgeball. Buddy up with her during the game and let her know she has value as a player. Or there might be a new girl who's eating lunch alone. Invite her to sit with you. When you share in others' burdens, you choose to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39). And when you do this, you are—like Gimli's friends—affirming their worth and value.

ACTION POINT: Make a list of people you know who may feel alone. Next to their names, write down an idea of how you can share their burden. Then, pick one person from the list to love this week.



ave you ever done something wrong and tried to cover it up? Once, I was using nail polish after my mom told me not to—and I spilled it on the carpet. I tried to use nail polish remover to get it out, but I only made it worse. When I thought about telling my mom, I felt ashamed. But when I confessed to her, she had a cleaner that took it right out!

Adam and Eve were naked when God put them in the Garden. But they didn't feel shame until they ate the fruit God told them not to eat. Then, instead of running to God, they tried to cover themselves with leaves! But it wasn't enough. So God made them clothes from animal skins to cover their shame. Just like I couldn't cover the stain of nail polish on my carpet by myself, we need help to cover the sin in our lives.

Eventually, God sent Jesus to die for our sins, creating a spiritual clothing that doesn't just cover us—it completely removes the stain of sin from our lives. It sets us free!

ACTION POINT: The next time you feel ashamed, confess it to Jesus and He will remove the stain of shame from your life.

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# Unfading Beauty

Don't be concerned about the outward beauty of fancy hairstyles, expensive jewelry, or beautiful clothes. You should clothe yourselves instead with the beauty that comes from within, the unfading beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which is so precious to God.

{ Ephesians 6:10-11 }

ur sun is so very small compared to other stars. And there are trillions of them. There's one star called Canis Majoris, a red supergiant star that is 2,000 times the size of our sun. And that huge thing is small compared to the universe.

In the original language of the Bible, the massive universe is referred to as *kosmos*, which literally means "something ordered." You can be sure that for all those planets and stars to stay where they are, there is some order to how they hang there in space. It's all miraculous and sings the praise of God (Psalm 19:1).

Guess what? The word for how you and I "clothe" ourselves in I Peter 3:3–4 above is also *kosmos*. (Mind blown!) The way we present ourselves to this world is supposed to be "something ordered." And that means we're less concerned with the outer part of ourselves that is fading and more concerned with the unfading beauty of a quiet spirit and gentleness.

Dressing so that nothing distracts from your gentleness and quiet spirit allows the kosmos of your being to shine bright like a star.

ACTION POINT: Do you get more excited about a new pair of jeans or lip gloss than you do learning about gentleness and quietness? Yeah, I do too, sometimes. Write a prayer asking God to help you care about your internal beauty.

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I urge you, first of all, to pray for all people. Ask God to help them; intercede on their behalf, and give thanks for them. Pray this way for kings and all who are in authority so that we can live peaceful and quiet lives marked by godliness and dignity. This is good and pleases God our Savior.

{ I Timothy 2:1-3 }

Charm is deceptive, and beauty does not last; but a woman who fears the Lord will be greatly praised. { Proverbs 31:30 }

harm is a quality of getting attention based on your physical beauty and personality traits. It might not seem like there is anything wrong with turning heads with your adorable curls, cute clothes, and whimsical humor. But the Bible says it's deceitful.

What? Adorable curls, cute clothes, and whimsical humor are bad? Nope! That's not what I said. I said using them to get attention is bad. The world will tell you that your most important asset is charm, or the ability to "wow" others with your external qualities. But the Bible says you've accomplished nothing important because your physical beauty won't last. If that's why people pay attention to you, it will fade.

In contrast, the verse says that a woman who fears God is something to notice! And even praise. In this verse, the word fear means to respect and honor and live your life as if He is the most important thing in the world.

We should want to turn God's head because of the way we live our lives, not the heads of the people in this world because of how we look. Make sense?

ACTION POINT: Do you fear God? I mean, do you want to respect Him and live your life to please Him? Write a list of five things you can do that demonstrate you want to honor Him.

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Then the way you live will always honor and please the Lord, and your lives will produce every kind of good fruit. All the while, you will grow as you learn to know God better and better. { Colossians 1:10 }





played softball in school and loved it. My team was awesome and filled with great players. One Saturday, we had a game against a local school. We were good...

but they were better. We played our hardest but couldn't seem to pull out a win.

That situation taught me that every decision I make either pulls people closer to Jesus or pushes them away from Him. I have to remember to represent Him well in all that I do.

Mark ACTION POINT: With your mom or a trusted adult, talk through decisions you've made lately. If they seem like good decisions that pull people closer to Jesus, way to go! If they don't, ask God to help you make the right choices.

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# Decadent Dignity

And now, dear brothers and sisters, one final thing. Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise. { Philippians 4:8 }

ave you ever gotten one of those assorted chocolate trays on a holiday like Christmas? It seems like every year my family receives heaps of them! Every chocolate in the box LOOKS good, but let's get one thing straight: not all of them TASTE good! Although some of the fillings—like caramel—are yummy, I'd argue that lots of them are kinda gross! These chocolates' outsides may look great, but their insides are quite yucky.

If there's anything I've learned from chocolate, it's that what is on the inside is actually way more important than what the outside looks like. The same applies to what's within us. How we think and what we put into our minds truly determines what's on our insides! Our thoughts control our actions and emotions. So, when we watch something that doesn't honor God, it negatively impacts our thoughts, affecting the rest of us. BUT when we fix our thoughts on the truth, our insides are positively influenced!

I dreamed of receiving such a crown and the title "Princess." Maybe you have also.



amuel was an Old Testament prophet and the last of the judges. God gave him great guidance. But sometimes, even Samuel had trouble seeing what God saw. God instructed him to go to a man named Jesse's house because God had selected one of Jesse's sons to be the next king of Israel.

When Samuel arrived, he looked at seven of Jesse's eight sons and thought he knew which one would be king. It was Eliab. He "fit" the type. But one by one, God rejected the oldest seven sons. I imagine Samuel's sigh when it came down to the baby brother, who had to be called in from the fields. Last but not least, this son came forth with a special glow. 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






# A Mule Named Ruthie



I'd hear older women say it when someone who wasn't wearing the most appropriate outfit passed by and wondered if it was only about clothing. Or, I'd hear people say it when others used language that wasn't the best, and I wondered if it was only about speech. I kept looking for a specific thing in life that needed to be done correctly for someone to be approved as "dignified."

First Corinthians 3:23 provided some clarity. Our dignity doesn't come from what we wear, say, or do. It comes from who we belong to—Jesus. When we accept the gift of salvation and become His followers, all areas of our lives are influenced by that decision, and dignity flows as a result.
